Tennessee Promise will provide Tennessee high school graduates the opportunity to attend a community or technical college free of tuition and fees. Tennessee promise is a scholarship and mentoring program that begins in the fall of 2015 for graduating seniors of the class of 2015. It will provide students a last-dollar scholarship, meaning the scholarship will cover tuition and fees not cov-Promise ered by the Pell grant, the HOPE scholarship, or TSAA funds. Students may use the scholarship at any of the state's 13 community colleges, 27 colleges of applied technology, or other eligible institu-

tion offering an associate's degree program. While removing the financial burden is key, a critical component of Tennessee Promise is the individual guidance each participant will receive from a mentor who will assist the student as he or she navigates the college admissions process. In addition, Tennessee Promise participants must complete eight hours of community service per term enrolled, as well as maintain satisfactory academic progress (2.0 GPA) at their institution.

For students to participate in the program they must meet several requirements and deadlines:

By November 1, 2014 Apply to the Tennessee Promise program, www.tnpromise.gov under student, you will then be contacted by partnering organization. More information is on the website telling other requirements. Do not miss out on this great opportunity.

### Symptoms, Diagnosis, Treatment & Management

Allergies are among the most common chronic conditions worldwide. Allergy symptoms of allergies range from making you miserable to putting you at risk for life-threatening reactions.

According to the leading experts in allergy, an allergic reaction begins in the immune system. Our immune system protects us from invading organisms that can cause illness. If you have an allergy, your immune system mistakes an otherwise harmless substance as an invader. This substance is called an allergen. The immune system overreacts to the allergen by producing Immuno-globulin E (IgE) antibodies. These antibodies travel to cells that release histamine and other chemicals, causing an allergic reaction.

#### **Allergy Symptoms**

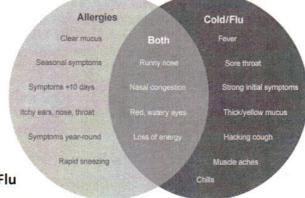
An allergic reaction typically triggers symptoms in the nose, lungs, throat, sinuses, ears, lining of the stomach or on the skin. For some people, allergies can also trigger symptoms of asthma. In the most serious cases, a life-threatening reaction called anaphylaxis (an-a-fi-LAK-sis) can occur.

A number of different allergens are responsible for allergic reactions. The most common include:

- Pollen
- Dust
- Food
- Insect stings
- Animal dander
- Mold

Is it a Allergy or the Cold/ Flu

The more you know about indoor and outdoor allergies, the more you can help us protect your family throughout the year.

Allergies can occur seasonally or year-round. The fancy name for seasonal allergies is seasonal allergic rhinitis, but it's most commonly known as hay fever.

Hay fever can occur in conjunction with the release of pollen by different trees or grasses during certain times of the year.

**Pollens** 



are the tiny reproductive cells of plants. Many trees, grasses, and low-growing weeds produce small, I light pollens that are easily airborne. Symptoms can be reduced by staying Indoors when the pollen count is high, and using a central air-conditioning system that recirculates air.

Ragweed



can produce 1 billion grains of pollen per season and is able to travel hundreds of miles on the wind. It is often responsible for late summer and early fall symptoms. Consider using this time of year to enjoy Indoor activities or vacation in an area with fewer ragweed plants.

Mold



is a multi-celled fungus. It is capable of growing both indoors and out, and requires only a damp surface to thrive. Outdoors, mold can be found on dead plant matter. When working out side, a dust mask can help reduce symptoms.
