You may have heard of the turmoil that was happening with White Oak Elementary School. The School Board of Campbell County proposed transferring the 6th, 7th, and 8th grades to Wynn Elementary School which for some students would be an extra 30 minutes of bus time. On Thursday June, 6, Campbell County had their regular School Board Finance Meeting and many parents (from both schools), teachers and community members attended this meeting; several people spoke about their concerns of this proposed change. Some concerns included: travel time, loss of jobs for the teachers, and the children.

On June, 11 the Campbell County School Board held their monthly meeting to discuss the fate of White Oak's 6,7, and 8th graders. Many parents, teachers, and community members attended the meeting. A proposal to keep the 6, 7, and 8th grades at White Oak without costing the School Board any money was sent to the school board and in the end the School Board voted not to move the students from White Oak to Wynn.

A special thank you is in order to Mr. Miller, Mr. Chadwell and all the parents, grandparents, teachers, and community members that attended these meetings and showed their support not only for the school but the students that attend the school.

About a year ago today I had just moved into the little guest house nestled on Woodland CLT on Roses Creek. My first experience moving up here and getting to meet folks was volunteering at the summer reading camp that woodland puts on for young kids at CCI, which I am lucky to end my time helping out with as well.

My time here has been filled with creating new lifelong friendships, getting more experience organizing in rural Appalachia, learning more about myself, and hopefully advancing the work of Woodland, SOCM, and the Tennessee Appalachian Community Economics (TNACE) group.

To build on the connections made from all of the conversations from door knocking and at the water utility, over the past few months our group has organized a series of community meetings to discuss how we can use this information within the community and our organizations. We have held three meetings so far in the communities of Eagan, White Oak, and Clairfield and our last event was a community cookout. Through these events we have had over 30 people engaged as either participants or volunteers. Popular themes that have emerged as part of these meetings so far have included: a need for community transportation, support for people struggling with addiction, more social events and things for young people to do, how to tap into the wealth from tourist passing through the community, new jobs, creating outdoor parks, and access to phone and internet towers. People also brought up organizing childcare, litter pick ups, support for the elderly, and addressing bullying within the community. We've also realized through the interviews and meetings that there is a great interest and need for social events that bring the community together and provide something to do. This project has brought in leadership from new residents within the Clearfork Valley that are now involved in planning and facilitating these community events and paving the way for next steps for how to use this information to better organize within the Clearfork Valley. We hope even more participants continue to become involved as the ideas and conversations develop more. When reflecting on my time during this year I can't believe the amount of people that I was able to meet and spend time with that welcomed me into their homes, and how much I was able to learn about this place and the people here. I think in a lot of ways my time here has affirmed how deep people care for each other, and how central community self reliance is to this place. Although I am moving out of the community (to Knoxville) I plan on continuing to be involved and come up as often as I can, and know that because of the friendships I have made that this will be my home away from home in many ways.

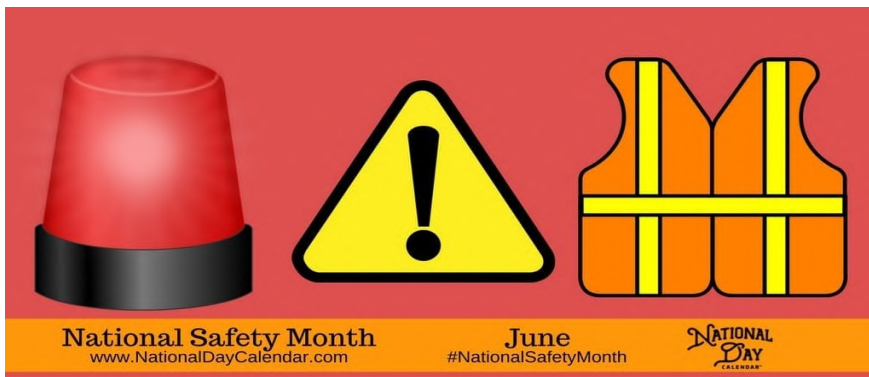
