

Seperated No More!

It appears as though the world is becoming more and more polarized; divided on so many issues-everything from what we

should or shouldn't do, to the food we eat, and to our religious beliefs. One can make an argument for most things one way or another. We are often found on opposite sides of the fence. A fence that not only separates us but that gets so overgrown sometimes by thorns, brambles and vines, and like the pea under the mattress, so big, that we often lose site of the true issue (s).

Today a fence was removed! The old wire fence at the Fonde-Pruden Cemetery in Bell County, Kentucky, located about a mile from the Tennessee line is now gone. The cemetery is a **WORK** and is in the process of becoming one whole in which one section will no longer be separated from the other. The dead who are interred know nothing of what has happened. The colored no longer separated by the line of segregation; the fence. A small section of the fence remains as a reminder of the separation



that once existed and of a time when others were treated differently because of the color of their skin.

We can't change the past and the mistakes that we've made which have left scars: emotional and or psychological for many for generations. Deep scars which unfortunately are not as easily removed like the fence; scars which can't be seen but felt and often internalized which creates and actually becomes the barriers (fences) to effective communication and in developing relationships. Will the blacks, the whites, the yellows, the reds, the Catholics, Methodists, the Baptists, the Jews, the Italians, the rich, the poor, (You get the picture)...... be separated in Heaven?

Obstacles, barriers and fences can often seem insurmountable. So with that in mind, I ask YOU the following questions:

- Do you have the strength to cross fences?
- Do you have the courage to cross fences?
- Do you believe that you can cross fences? Can you? "Do it!"
- Can you trust God to help you cross fences?

Maybe we should spend less time building fences and more time trying to cross or remove them as to see and understand why others are on the other side and just what the true issue is and how it can be resolved so as not to create further separation.

Crossing fences (breaking down barriers to create opportunities for communication and developing relationships) isn't easy! I've been scratched, prodded and have bled a few times and do bear some deep scars of my own but.....it's worth getting to the other side. For in Heaven, Brothers and Sisters because of what Christ did (paid our ransom once and for all with His death which eliminated the veil, the middle man and the seemingly endless sacrifices) there will be no fences (physical, social, emotional and or psychological).

We will be separated no more!
